Field dates: September 2 to 8, 2015

Panel source: Voice of Alberta & Vision Critical

• n=1446

- Weighted to reflect gender, age and region of Alberta population according to Stats Canada
- This online survey utilizes a representative but non-random sample, therefore margin of error is not applicable. However, a probability sample of this size would yield a margin of error of +/- 2.6 percentage points at a 95% confidence interval.
- Accuracy of sub-samples of the data decline based on sample sizes












ALBERTANS' PERCEPTIONS ON POTENTIAL MEDICAL PRACTITIONER FEE REGULATION -BY LAST VOTE-

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
